

CRANBURY COLLEGE ADDITIONAL SUPPORT PACKAGES



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WHO ARE WE?

Cranbury College is a Pupil Referral Unit Academy for young people in the Reading area. Our young people range from 5 - 16 years old. We support learners recovering from the trauma of permanent exclusion, those that unintentionally exclude themselves from education and children who cannot access school for medical reasons.

We are a multi-site organisation which includes our College Road Site – Cranbury College Primary and Cranbury Road Site – Cranbury College Secondary. We have an Outreach Behaviour Support Team, offer medical tuition and have a Hospital Teaching Service based at Royal Berkshire Hospital. We also offer bespoke support/training to teachers/staff in schools working with children struggling to engage. We offer a variety of support to children and young people in years 1 - 11, who are finding it difficult in their mainstream setting. We help pupils develop their self-esteem and confidence to regulate their own emotions, in order to cope more effectively with the challenges that mainstream schools can present for some.

THE HOSPITAL TEACHING SERVICE

The Cranbury College Hospital Teaching Service is a small team of two teachers and two HLTAs who teach children admitted to Dolphin and Lion wards of the Royal Berkshire Hospital. Children who cannot attend school because of their medical needs have a legal right to a full-time education.

Children are offered 1:1 teaching from day one of their stay in hospital. Staff are trained to teach a wide range of subjects. The main focus of teaching is on literacy, numeracy and art. Staff are also trained to work with children of all abilities including those with complex special needs. The team are trained to support children with mental health needs including eating disorders. We work alongside parents and encourage their involvement in activities. Reading is a very important part of all our teaching; we are fortunate to be supported by Read For Good and Listening Books. Many children are given a new book to take home and audiobooks are used when children are unable to read due to medical conditions.



PRIMARY SITE

Cranbury College Primary is based on a residential road in east Reading. Our pupils are children who have been permanently excluded from their mainstream setting. Work is topic-based, with a new topic every half term. The emphasis is on a therapeutic approach to SEMH needs. We support children to self-regulate, and engage in learning, with a view to being placed in a permanent setting which is appropriate to their needs; be that a specialist setting or returning to mainstream. Engagement with parents/guardians is a vital part of our work.



We also sit on the Admissions Panel of the local SEMH school and also on the SEN panel at Brighter Futures for Children, when time allows.

Cranbury College also offer Outreach Support Packages for schools. Further information can be found in the Outreach section of this brochure.

SECONDARY SITE



The main secondary site is located near to town in west Reading.

Our children are with us primarily having received a permanent exclusion. We also offer a variety of outreach packages as well as regular behaviour clinics to support mainstream settings with their most vulnerable students.

We also offer bespoke internal support, as well as intervention workshops for schools. Requests can be made via the **professionals tab** on the website.

KS3/4 INTERVENTION WORKSHOPS

OUR AIM

Our aim is to offer the workshops to a small group of secondary students in the local area who would benefit from targeted intervention with our skilled team. We hope that from these workshops students are able to reflect, learn support strategies to improve their outcomes and build upon their skills to enable them to be successful in a main stream environment.

WORKSHOPS

The packages are offered to schools in a six-week block where each student will receive two 45-minute sessions on a weekly basis. In total, each student will receive 12 intervention sessions and return to school with an exit report and a work booklet record of their sessions.

The workshops will run between 2:00 and 3:30 and schools are responsible for arranging transport to and from our site.

There will be limited spaces available for each six week block of intervention sessions with a maximum of 4 students per package.

HOW TO MAKE A REFERRAL

Schools are asked to complete the referral form on the Cranbury College website under our professionals tab.

Places will be allocated on a first come first served basis and we ask schools not to refer more than one student per package in one term.




PRIMARY OUTREACH

Cranbury Primary Behaviour Outreach service works with Reading mainstream primary schools and academies to support students with their Social, Emotional and Mental Health (SEMH) needs, which may compromise their learning and /or the learning of their peers. We provide early, targeted support for children who do not currently have Education, Health and Care plans (EHCP).

Our aims

- Remove barriers to learning
- Empower schools and parents
- To reduce the number of students at risk of exclusion.
- To support schools to reduce suspensions.



Cranbury Engaged' is our bolt-on intervention offer which can be accessed within Tier 1 and 2 support for an individual student.

It can also be accessed via referral, for a group of students.

CRANBURY ENGAGED

(Intervention offer to local schools)

Behaviour Outreach Support Officers can provide either 1:1 or small group interventions. This includes, but is not limited to:

- Draw and talk
- ELSA
- Lego Therapy
- Self-identity and self esteem
- Anger Management
- Social Skills

CORE PACKAGE

RESET PACKAGE


(Only accessible if engaged in Tier 2 level package Not included in school's forum)

- In reach within Cranbury Primary Alternative Provision
- Students can attend either an AM or PM session
- Minimum of 6 weeks and maximum of 12 weeks
- Assessment and Intervention report
- Support students back into mainstream
- Mid way review with school and parents

COSTINGS

Cranbury Engaged and **Reset** will have a cost for schools and are not included in School's Forum.

Schools and academies, which do not contribute to School's Forum, are required to pay for Tier 1, 2 and 3, packages.

SECONDARY OUTREACH

This team consists of 2 members of staff who have extensive experience of working with young people and their families within both a mainstream and alternative education setting.

Members of the team have previously worked within a wide range of settings such as youth work, social care, family support, careers guidance and formal teaching. This previous experience enables the team to draw on a wide range of approaches and techniques so that schools who access our help can be effectively supported by an experienced member of the team. The Secondary Outreach service offers predominantly 1:1 support for students who are struggling with the demands of mainstream education.

Specialist Support

Detailed below are the most common reasons for referral.



- At risk of permanent exclusion. •
- Difficulty in managing emotions.
- Support in managing reactions and self-regulation.
- Non-attendance/engagement with education.
- Support and guidance with Careers and composing post Yr11 'moving on' plans.
- Supporting students who struggle with the emotional demands of mainstream education.

KS1 & 2 CURRICULUM

The curriculum at Cranbury College is broad, balanced and carefully constructed to underpin a learning environment that is relevant, ambitious, and accessible for all. Cranbury College delivers a high-quality curriculum with a range of pathways that suit the academic needs, as well as pastoral needs, of all pupils. Where appropriate, a range of Alternative Provisions are provided, based on the needs of the pupils within the College.

KEY STAGE 1 & 2 (EYFS)

Within the primary unit at Cranbury College, pupils are taught using an individualised and personalised timetable. Each term is topic-based, with cross-curricular learning at the heart of the primary setting.

KS4 CURRICULUM

Within Key Stage 4, pupils follow a core curriculum which supports examination preparation as well as reintegration into mainstream settings. Where appropriate, Alternative Provision is provided to support pupils pastorally, as well as academically.

Within KS4, all students follow a core curriculum which consists of the following:

- English (GCSE and Functional Skills)
- Maths (GCSE and Functional Skills)
- Science (GCSE and AQA Unit Awards)
- Digital Skills (Level 1 and 2)
- Food

- Art (GCSE and Awards)
- Option (Hair/Beauty, Trades and Life Skills)
- Sport (Core)
- Personal Development
- Duke of Edinburgh Award (Bronze)

Sub divided within Core subjects is a VIG pathway: Vocational, ILP and GCSE. Student pathways are determined by departmental data analysis and CAT4 results. Each core subject offers a differentiated learning journey, so that all pupils can work towards their personalised academic goals.

In addition to the curriculum offer, all pupils within Key Stage 4 follow the Cranbury College Certificate of Excellence Programme. This consists of a variety of vocational qualifications which are selected based on the needs of the learners, cultural capital and personal interests. Each term consists of a new topic which provides students with the opportunity to gain certification with exam boards such as ASDAN, NCFE and AQA.




